

THOUGHTS FROM THE RECTORY

I was asked the following question recently 'What does the word Lent mean?'

The word Lent is derived from the Old English *lencten*, which means "lengthen." It refers to the lengthening of the daylight hours that occurs in the northern hemisphere as spring approaches. It is in this period of transition from late winter to early spring that the season of Lent falls.

But what is Lent about for us as followers of Christ and how can we use that time fruitfully? Lent reminds us of the forty days that Christ spent in the Wilderness, coping with the temptations of the world and spending time in prayer and contemplation preparing himself for his ministry.

So how for us today can we use this season of Lent? We are unlikely to be in a position to go off for 40 days, tempting as that might seem, and anyway, I would want somewhere much more comfortable than a Wilderness. For many, Lent is a time to give up something like chocolates or wine. But although that is a good discipline, it is not very productive unless you use the money you have saved for a good cause. Lent is rather a journey of self-discovery, an opportunity to deepen our relationship with God, to take time out to read the scriptures, read a spiritual book, spend time listening to God, soak in the wonders of his In the benefice there will be the opportunity to join the Lent course as we explore the 'Women of Holy Week'. We will be looking at the Easter journey through the lives of some of the women in Jesus' life Women who are brought into the centre of the drama of Holy Week and how we are the beneficiaries of the stories that they tell. Details of the course are elsewhere in this magazine.

So, as we begin that journey turning away from the crib towards the cross let us find time in all the busyness of life to deepen our relationship with God and to experience the abundance of his love for each one of us.

I wish you a truly fruitful and blessed Lent.





William Nicholson MBE

My sister Jennifer and I have strong memories of a very young William building a road network round the garden at The Garth (on School Hill in Midgham). A few years on, a canal holiday and a family boat meant that he transferred his enthusiasm to canals, and at 17 started doing voluntary restoration work on the Kennet and Avon Canal. Since then he has been deeply involved in voluntary canal restoration and has taken on roles at all levels to achieve this.

When he left university in 1980 and started work as a town planner Bill got involved with the Newbury Branch of the Kennet and Avon Canal Trust (KACT), and then formed the Newbury Working Party Group (NWPG) to recruit people to become actively involved in canal restoration. Many members were recruited by word of mouth, or through seeing posters in libraries, but it was a very dangerous thing to be related to, or a colleague of Bill's if you weren't planning to spend your spare time restoring canals! Bill has been the driving force of this group, which has participated in canal restoration projects all over the country through a regular programme of weekend working parties and canal camps. 43 years on the group is still going strong.

In addition to his roles as organiser and leader of working parties and camps Bill has been responsible for specific projects on a number of canals. In the past he has been a trustee of the KACT and the Chair of the Newbury Branch, and since his retirement has been appointed a trustee of the Wey and Arun Canal Trust.

It is for this work that Bill has been awarded the MBE. His role in all these projects has made a huge contribution to the restoration of canals, recognising their legacy and creating amenities which provide recreation, nature conservation, water management and wonderful spaces for everybody to enjoy. ALDERMASTON CHURCHYARD



Visitors to Aldermaston churchyard

Over the past 3 weeks ornithologists have been gathering at Aldermaston Estate and the Church to photograph and watch the waxwings which have flown over from Scandinavia.



The Waxwing is a plump bird, which is slightly smaller than a Starling. It has a prominent crest (head feathers that stick up). It's reddish-brown with a black throat, a small black mask around its eye, yellow and white in the wings and a yellow-tipped tail. It does not breed in the UK, but is a winter visitor. In some years, we see larger numbers of visiting Waxwings, called irruptions, when the population in their breeding grounds gets too big for the food available.

Learning from genocide - for a better future

Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) takes place each year on 27 January, marking the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp.

Holocaust Memorial Day Trust (HMDT) encourages remembrance in a world scarred by genocide. They promote remembrance of the 6 million Jews murdered during the Holocaust, alongside the millions of people murdered under Nazi persecution of other groups and during more recent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

'The Holocaust threatened the fabric of civilisation, and genocide must still be resisted every day. Our world often feels fragile and vulnerable and we cannot be complacent. Even in the UK, prejudice and the language of hatred must be challenged by us all.

Each year across the UK, thousands of people come together to learn more about the past and take action to create a safer future. Together they bear witness for those who endured genocide, and honour the survivors and all those whose lives were changed beyond recognition.





by Elie Wiesel

As a boy, Elie Wiesel survived Auschwitz and Buchenwald camps. As an adult, he dedicated himself to commemorating the Holocaust and to ensuring its lessons were learnt. He was an acclaimed author and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize. He died on 2 July 2016, aged 87. *Night* is the account of Elie Wiesel and his father's experiences in Auschwitz and Buchenwald concentration camps.

Holy Communion with the Imposition of Ashes


14th February 2024

What is Ash Wednesday?

Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence; from the middles ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The calculation of the forty days of Lent has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual in the West to count them continuously to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays which are feast days), so beginning Lent on the sixth Wednesday before Easter, Ash Wednesday.

Come and join us for our Lenten study group.

The stories imagine what it might have been like to accompany Jesus in this final week of his life from the perspective of nine women. Some of them we know with certainty were there because the Gospels tell us they were: the widow with two coins, the woman with the ointment of pure nard, Mary wife of Clopas, Mary Magdalene, Mary mother of Jesus. Some are not mentioned at all, but someone like them was probably present: a woman journeying to Jerusalem for the Passover, the wife of a scribe, and a female disciple at the Last Supper. The stories also aim to travel from the outside in: from people who had the most fleeting encounters with Jesus at the start of the week to his most devoted followers at the end.

The sessions will be at 2pm on Wednesday afternoons at the Rectory on the following dates:

SAINT VALENTINES DAY – 14TH FEB

The day gets its name from the famous saint, but there are several stories of who he was. The widely accepted and popular belief is that St Valentine was a priest from Rome who lived in the third century and is thought to have died around 270 AD.

At the time, Emperor Claudius II had banned marriages as he thought single men made better soldiers. However, St Valentine took it upon himself to arrange and perform marriages in secret so couples could still celebrate their love.

What happened to St Valentine?

Unfortunately, the Emperor found out and imprisoned Valentine, sentencing him to death for his crime. One account suggests that, whilst imprisoned, Valentine fell in love with his jailer's daughter and on the day of his execution (February 14) he sent her a love letter signed 'from your Valentine.'

Where is St Valentine buried?

Love is all around – and, somewhat less romantically, so are the remains of St Valentine. St. Valentine, the patron saint of love, was executed in Rome and buried there in the 3rd century, as previously mentioned. However, in 1835 an Irish priest, Father John Spratt, convinced Pope Gregory XVI to dig up St. Valentine's remains and take them home as a gift to his fellow Irishmen and women. So his remains now lie under Whitefriar Church in Dublin.

Except... it's also thought that a flower-crowned skull is that of St Valentine's, and this is exhibited in the Basilica of Santa Maria in Cosmedin, Rome. And it doesn't end there. It is thought that some of St Valentine's remains are in Scotland. In Glashow, the church of the Blessed John Duns Scotus also claims some of the bones of St Valentine.

How did Valentine's Day start?

Valentine's Day is said to have originated from a Roman Festival known as Lupercalia, according to History.com, with the first Valentine's Day thought to have taken place in the year 496. It was held on February 15 as a festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman God of agriculture.

It's thought that as part of the celebrations, boys drew names of girls from a box. Interestingly, they would be boyfriend and girlfriend during the festival and sometimes these matches would lead to marriage.

Later on, the church wanted to turn this festival into a Christian celebration and decided to use it to remember St Valentine too. Lupercalia continued for some time but was outlawed at the end of the 5th century when Pope Gelasius declared February 14 as St Valentine's Day.
